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# **PASTOR'S NOTE:**

Greetings in the name of Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord!

Jesus said to them, "But who do you say that I am?"

Matthew 16:15

It is no secret that here in the United States, it seems that God has fallen out of favor. For those of us who have spent years, maybe lifetimes, trying to follow Jesus, this is hard for us to understand. We are confused by more and more people turning away from God, not attending church, and not actively participating in a faith community. And honestly, here at Good Shepherd, we still have many people who regularly attend worship and continue to actively participate in this faith community. This means that we are not feeling the cultural effect to its most significant degree, but that does not mean that we are not feeling it at all, because we certainly are.

Now, there are a lot of reasons for our current cultural situation. Your counsel and visioning team has been wrestling with this as well, and not surprisingly, growth is one area of much discussion. There are no simple and easy steps for the road ahead.

However, I think that the journey may start here. A couple of Sundays ago, we heard Jesus ask two critical questions of his followers. Jesus was standing in a place where many people were worshiping many different gods, and he first asked the disciples, "Who do people say that the Son of Man is?" And then he asked them the most important question, the question we said changes everything. He asked, "But who do you say that I am?"

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I believe this is the critical question. I believe this is the place where our journey back to a culture that is actively worshiping God, and actively participating in a faith community and doing ministry together - I believe the journey back to this place starts with whether we are willing to wrestle with and answer Jesus' question – "But who do you say that I am?" Our answer will change everything. I wonder if our culture today is afraid of this question? I wonder if each of us is afraid of this question?

I think many times our answer may be that God is a vending machine. Now, it is true that this is not found in Scripture anywhere. Jesus never says, "Let me be your vending machine." The closest we may get to this is something like Jesus saying, "Ask, and it will be given you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened for you." ( Luke 11:9)

Jesus said to them,

"But who do you say that I am?"

Matthew 16:15

There is much to like about a vending machine Jesus. It does not require much from you. There is a glass partition that keeps you from getting too involved in conversation or in a relationship. You make your selection as to what you want from Jesus, and you place your request. And it is provided to you. This is where you get to say things like, God wants me to be happy. I just want to be me. I just want to be myself.

Perhaps, sometimes our answer may be, that Jesus is my friend. Throughout scripture, we hear of Jesus calling others friend. For example, when Jesus healed a man who was paralyzed that had been lowered through the roof of a house, it says, "When he saw their faith, Jesus said, 'Friend, your sins are forgiven you." (Luke 5:20)

It is certainly true that in Jesus, God meets us where we are. And yes, we can ask Jesus for things almost as if he is like a vending machine. And yes, we can expect Jesus to be our friend. But both of these answers to who Jesus is requires little to nothing from us.

But long ago, the prophet Micah shared that God does require something from us - "To do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God." (Micah 6:8)

Walking with God means that we are to be in a relationship with God. When Jesus invites us to follow him, he is inviting us into a relationship with him. And relationships require something from us.

It is through our relationship with Jesus, that, like Simon Peter and the disciples, we can come to answer Jesus' question of, "Who do you say that I am?" And also say to Jesus, "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God."

The Messiah was understood before Jesus' day to be the God-appointed king for the end of all time, and would also be known as the anointed one. By Jesus' time, it was understood that the Messiah would come and destroy the hostile powers here on earth, save all of God's people, and set up a new and glorious kingdom of God here on earth that would reign forever. The title of this One, this King, in addition to being the Messiah, Savior, anointed one, the title for this One would also be Christ.

The reason why our answer to this question from Jesus of, "But who do you say that I am?" can change everything is, if we answer that Jesus is the Messiah, the Christ, then our whole life must be oriented around him.

No longer will our vending machine Jesus be enough for us. Now we will see that Jesus is much more than just a friend. Now, we no longer get to live our lives to just be who we are. No longer can we say, "I just want to be myself."

God meets us where we are at, but God does not leave us there. Jesus invites us to follow him, so we can be who God created us to be. This world tells us we should celebrate our self. That sounds fun. That is easy. It is clear why so many people say no to Jesus' invitation to follow. What is not to like with our vending machine Jesus? It is good to know that Jesus is my friend that I can call on in times of need. And in the meantime, I just want to be me.

If our answer to Jesus' question, "But who do you say that I am?" is "You are the Messiah, the Christ," it means no longer do we live our life as a celebration of self. Instead, we live our life as a celebration of God. We no longer define ourselves, but we are defined by God, as part of the body of Christ.

The bottom line is, if we are striving to just be who we are, we do not need Jesus for that. However, if we are going to be who God created us to be, then, we will most definitely need Jesus, the Messiah, the Savior, the Christ, for this.

And as with any relationship, it grows as we spend time with one another, and we share ourselves with, and give of ourselves, to one another. The same is true with our relationship with Jesus the Messiah, Jesus the Christ.

I pray that each of us will continue to grow in our relationship with Jesus. You can do some of this on your own,

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doing things such as praying and reading scripture. I hope you will take part in many of the opportunities provided here at Good Shepherd to grow your relationship with God and with one another, such as participating in the various mercy and justice ministries we do together. Your participation in worship is important - it is where we hear and sing God's word, where we confess that we are not

God, and that Jesus is the Christ. It is where we are fed and nourished by Christ's body and blood. And it is where we share his peace.

And I sincerely hope that you and your family will take part in our other offerings here at Good Shepherd, such as our Christian education programs, including adult Sunday school. I also hope you will join in our eight-week group discussion on season one of The Chosen.

All of this is part of growing your relationship with Jesus the Messiah, Jesus the Christ. All of this is part of how you can answer Jesus' question to you, "But who do you say that I am?"

- Insect repellent if desired


There are restrooms, plenty of parking, electricity, playground equipment, nature trails and more.



## Hello from the preschool!!



The Chosen depicts the life of Jesus and his followers in a new and exciting way.

After hearing about the show, you may wish to join Pastor Ted and Kim each week as together, we journey through Season 1.
