As we enter the heart of summer, for many a time for breaks, vacations, or at least a change of pace, I do hope for each of you that you have the opportunity to relax, to recreate in healthy ways, and to reflect.

I wanted to share something I have been reflecting on lately. It seems to me that this world is in need of more wisdom, both individually and collectively.

The above scripture is from the book of Ecclesiastes, which is considered Biblical wisdom literature. Ecclesiastes is therefore meant to be a contemplative part of scripture that one would spend meaningful time reflecting on. Said another way, it is a book that is best read slowly, which seems like something to do in the heart of summer when we hopefully experience time to reflect and relax a bit. The book of Ecclesiastes addresses big topics like the meaning of life, as well as the pursuit of happiness and fulfillment. Again, the kinds of things it is good to reflect on during the slower days of summer.

This book of Ecclesiastes, and specifically Chapter 3, also fits with what I have been reflecting on more specifically, and that is the challenge of answering the questions of what and when. These questions seem very basic and that means we think that answering them should be easy, but if we look around our world today, it seems clear that we are having trouble arriving at good and healthy answers to the questions of what and when. Our culture struggles with both of these questions, while trying to give us easy answers. To the question of what, our culture tells us, do whatever you want. To the question of when, the answer of this world is, whenever you want. Added to all of this is that many of our businesses and almost all of our social media give us more specific answers to both these questions. To the question of what, everything, all of it. To the question of when, now.

We are constantly having to answer these questions of what and when regarding matters and decisions that range from big to small, and important to insignificant. Especially for those most significant of matters and decisions, the question becomes, how do we figure out the answers to these questions. What should I do and when should I do it?

A word we often use in the faith context related to figuring out answers to these questions is discernment. Discernment is the work of arriving at good judgment and understanding. In short, making wise decisions.

In response to the question of how we figure out the answers to the significant what and when questions in life, I believe the key is found in the answer to another question, which is, who are you going to listen to. As noted above, we already know what this world often gives us for the answers.

As people of faith, as Christians, we have what some people might call a secret weapon. The truth is, it is not a weapon, and we are supposed to help make sure that it is not a secret. As Christians we know who we are to listen to as we go about answering the what and when questions. We are to first listen to God. God gave us God's word, Jesus Christ, for a whole host of life-giving reasons, including helping us to make wise decisions. For all the questions we have, including the questions of what and when, we should take these questions to God, and then we should pause long enough to discern with God as we listen to God's reply.

It is good for each of us to be reminded that we should turn first to God for this discernment. It is also good to remember that God has provided us with one another, fellow siblings in Christ, to discern with as well. In future articles, I will share thoughts about what this discernment can look like.

For now, during the heart of summer, I invite you to relax, to recreate in healthy ways, and to reflect. Take time over these next couple of months and turn to God first, and listen to God's word in answering your questions of what and when.

Scripture tells us that "For everything there is a season, a time for every matter under heaven." In order to answer the questions for the whats and whens in your life, I encourage each of us to take the time to turn first to God in order to seek wise answers to these questions. And to then turn to our sisters and brothers in Christ to help us continue to discern God-centered answers to these most important of questions.

Blessings on these days of summer and on our conversations, prayers, and discernment with God and with each other.

If you would like to volunteer to help with the outdoor service, please contact Elena Cressy, Megan Ebke or Thad Reist. Volunteer opportuni-


ties consist of coordinating and transporting worship supplies, playing guitar, and helping with the potluck.

Good Shepherd Network Members joined in the 10 year Celebration of Justice Matters on June 10th.

We celebrated the following issues that Justice Matters has retired:

- The establishment of an Affordable Housing Trust Fund was achieved.
- The JailNo expansion in Douglas County was a success.
- Jail Alternatives, as stated in the VERA Report, are being used by CJCC.
- CIT training of law enforcement personnel in Douglas County was achieved.
- Treatment & Recovery Center is open and fully operational.

Restorative Practices will be monitored at least through the end of the 2024 school year. Research committees are still working on the issues of Ending Chronic Homelessness and Elder Care Workforce.

Justice Matters Network Members will choose an additional issue this year at our Solutions Briefing.

Please be sure to attend one of Good Shepherd's "Listening Sessions" this fall and share your stories about personal injustices in Douglas County. Each congregant will be invited by Team Leaders to attend a Listening Session.

Justice Matters will continue to work for Justice to flow down like a mighty river in Douglas County!
