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I also want to wish you blessings on this new calendar year. It is hard to believe that 2024 is gone and we are now beginning 2025.

For many, if not most of us, being at the start of something invites us to be filled with anticipation, expectation, and hope. A new calendar year often does exactly that, and so we have New Year resolutions. It is a time when we may reflect on the past and make some intentional choices about how we plan to do things differently going forward based on our expectations and hope. That is where our resolutions come in. We set goals. We come up with things such as a personal mission statement, or a mantra, or a centering word, for the new year.

That all sounds great, except most of us know the success rate when it comes to New Year resolutions. Most of us are aware of how crowded the parking lots are at the fitness centers and at the Sports Pavilion at Rock Chalk Park. For the first 2 or 3 weeks of January, that is. After that, many people have given up on their resolutions and have gone back to their old ways. Most of us have been there and can totally relate to this pattern.

There is nothing wrong with the anticipation, expectation, and hope that comes from fresh starts and new beginnings. In fact, we could argue that we were created that way. But we also know that time and time again, it has been proven that our will, our willpower, is not enough to make these kinds of changes happen, and to then reach our goals, in spite of what we tell ourselves and how hard we try. At the very least, it makes us tired and weary. This is where it is good to reflect on the verse from Matthew 19:26, what for us is impossible, is completely possible for God.

Which brings us back to a question that was asked of each one of us at our Christmas Eve worship services. There is nothing wrong with taking time to reflect on the past, and then being filled with anticipation, expectation, and hope about choosing intentional ways of living differently going forward. In fact, it is a sign of maturity and wisdom. And it is important for us to notice that God has given us a variety of times and events that invite us to see new beginnings.

We just celebrated one, the birth of God's Son, Jesus Christ. There are many others throughout God's story, including Jesus' death and resurrection.

So, in our weariness, and in the midst of this weary world, in our need to rejoice, on Christmas Eve we saw that even though this world said there was no room for Jesus - God made room and Jesus was born and given to us. The world said there was no room at the inn, and God made room in a stable. Knowing that through Jesus, God made room for us, on Christmas Eve, the question was asked of each of us, "Will you make room in your life for Jesus?"

If you say Yes, or want to say Yes, you may be thinking of all the things you would have to do, or of what you might have to remove or get rid of, to make room. Maybe you have tried before, and it did not stick. After all, we know the success rate of resolutions. We know that our willpower is not enough. You may wonder now, what will make this any different.

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To the question of, will you make room in your life for Jesus, you will need to put Jesus in the center of your life. When we do that, it is no longer about our resolutions and goals, but it is about Christ's desire for us. It is true, our will power is not enough for this kind of change, but when Christ is the center of your life, it is no longer about our will, our will power, it is about His will, His power. As the verse from Luke 22:42 reminds us, Jesus himself points us to God's will in all parts of our lives.

If you need a mission statement, or mantra, or centering word, Jesus has provided it. Take him at his word, his invitation, when he says, "Follow me." As we have shared before, another way to keep Christ at the center is to simply choose our next action based on will this please the heart of Jesus? Will this make Jesus smile?

Yes, it is good to reflect on the past and make intentional choices about how we will live differently going forward. For us as Christians, that includes things like prayer, reading scripture, attending worship, serving others - but all of this is truly doable when you make room in your life for Jesus, and you put him at the center.

And if you are concerned about the poor success of most resolutions that are kicked off at the start of something, at a time of new beginning, such as a new calendar year – there is Good News for you.

With Christ at the center of your life, it is at his birth, at his death on the cross, and at his resurrection and the empty tomb, and in our baptism, you are continually given a fresh start, a new beginning. New life is yours in Jesus Christ - today and every day in 2025, and beyond. It is when Christ is at the center of your life, that we can understand what Paul spoke of in the verse from Philippians 4:13, when we are following him, when we are doing his will, then we can do all things through Christ who strengthens us.

Again, blessings to you on this new calendar year! Together may we not just make room in our life for Jesus, but may he be the center of our life.


<u>Annual Congregational Meeting</u> – January 19th – **ONE service only at 10:00 am** followed by our congregational meeting.
