

Greetings in the name of Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord!

"And he thought to himself, 'What should I do, for I have no place to store my crops?' Then he said, 'I will do this: I will pull down my barns and build larger ones.'"

Luke 12:17-18

As we move into the heart of summer, I hope this season brings you moments of rest, renewal, and reflection. My prayer is that this change of pace offers you the space to take a breath, step back, and thoughtfully consider your life - where it's headed, what it's filled with, and what, if anything, might need adjusting.

The scripture quoted is part of the Gospel reading we will hear in worship on August 3. Jesus tells a parable about a rich man whose life is full. He pauses to reflect, asking himself what to do with his abundance. His answer? Build bigger barns.

In many ways, we can relate to this man. While the definition of "rich" varies depending on which kingdom you're referencing—God's or the world's—most of us know what it means to feel full. Full schedules. Full closets. Full calendars. Full inboxes. Our lives are often crowded not just with possessions, but also with activity, information, noise, and distraction.

And so, we find ourselves echoing the man in the parable: "What should I do?" "I will build bigger barns."

For us, this may mean another storage unit, a crammed garage, or even more time-consuming commitments. But is more space, or more stuff, really the answer?

Jesus offers us something different: not more room for more things, but a new way of being. Like the woman at the well, we are invited to drink from the living water that truly satisfies. What if our lives are already full enough - not in terms of capacity, but of content? The real question isn't whether our lives are full, but what they are full of.

Summer can be a sacred time to take inventory. What do we need to let go of? What habits, possessions, or priorities

might need to be cleared away? And just as importantly, what should take their place?

You may have heard the advice that if you want to get rid of a bad habit, you cannot simply eliminate it and leave the open space, that you need to fill that space with a good habit instead. God does not call us to live empty lives, but full ones—filled with the right things.

Just a couple of weeks ago, as we celebrated the Day of Pentecost, the people were filled with the Holy Spirit. Later in the book of Acts, in 13:52, it says that the disciples were filled with joy and with the Holy Spirit.

In Romans, the Apostle Paul speaks to both the Jews and the Gentiles in 15:13 saying, "May the God of hope fill you will all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound (i.e. be filled with) hope by the power of the Holy Spirit."

The riches Jesus gives us - daily bread, living water, eternal life - are beyond compare. We are already rich beyond measure, not by the standards of the world, but through the grace of God. So rather than building bigger barns, let us make room in our hearts and lives for the fruit of the Spirit:

"Love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, and self-control." (Galatians 5:22)

This Season after Pentecost, our theme is: **Spirit Formed. Spirit Filled. Spirit Led.** 

Let's embrace that fully. Let the Spirit help you clear out what needs to go, and fill you with what gives life. May this summer be a time of sacred reflection, Spirit-filled living, and joyful abundance.

## **JUSTICE · MATTERS**

Our Nehemiah Action Assembly was held in May with over four hundred in attendance. Commissioner Amber Sellers committed to identify and gather a group of stakeholders from Lawrence and Douglas County to explore proven systemic solutions to address youth trauma in our community. Andy Brown, Deputy Secretary for the Kansas Department for Aging and Disability Services and Kelsee Fout, Maternal and Child Behavioral Health Director with the Bureau of Family Health at Kansas Department of Health and Environment, committed to explore proven systemic solutions to address youth trauma in our community. We heard powerful testimony from Jessica about the power of healing and resilience after significant childhood trauma. We heard from Jason and Renae about how the work to end homelessness impacted their lives. They were connected with resources,

support and housing. And we celebrated the signing of the Memorandum of Understanding between Kansas WorkforceOne and Dwyer Workforce. Students are now being enrolled in CNA classes.

We held a gathering in June where we celebrated our Network Members who are the heartbeat in making the JUSTICE MATTERS NEVERENDING STORY. That NEVERENDING STORY includes affordable housing, mental health, restorative practices in our Schools, elder care workforce, ending chronic homelessness and reducing youth trauma.

Good Shepherd was presented the award for Highest Percentage of Regular Worship Attendance at the Nehemiah Action Assembly!





## ELCA Central States Synod Assembly Notes Submitted by Wally Resner and Mary Ricke, 2025 GSLC Delegates

The Pentecost-based theme of the synod meeting was Renewed by the Spirit. It was a very "Holy Spirit-filled" event.

Our current Central States synod Bishop, Rev. Susan Candea, presided over the meeting. In addition, our national ELCA Bishop, Elizabeth Eaton, was present all three days, presenting a couple times in as well as leading the group with the ballot process for the election of our new Central States Synod Bishop.

It was special to meet so many Central States Synod people, so filled with the Holy Spirit, along with several people we already knew. Mary was able to visit with her pastor and wife from her home congregation in Hoisington, KS.

The election of our new Bishop took several ballots, narrowing the candidate list on each ballot. As we prepared to vote on each ballot, it was preceded by singing, praying, and finally a time of silence, allowing the Holy Spirit to work before our voting. This was another tremendous reminder of how the Spirit works. Once the candidate numbers were down to three, they were each individually presented with several questions that they answered for the voting body.

Finally, based on the voting on each ballot, only two remained on the final ballot. They were Donna Simon and Zac Sturm. The final vote was extremely close with Donna Simon being elected as our new Central Sates Synod Bishop on Saturday morning, June 7, 2025.

There were various amendments voted on and passed. We not only voted for the new Bishop but also for other synodical positions.

We listened to the Treasurer's report with the good news of a surplus this past year as opposed to a budget deficit the previous year. Still a reminder to us that congregational giving is on the decline as it's been over the past 20 years. The proposed budget for fiscal year 2026 was presented and approved.

#### **Personal Highlights**

- Worship services were held as part of the synod assembly, both on Thursday, June 5, and Saturday, June 7.
- There was a wonderful worship band which included clergy from various Central States churches. Their music added so much to the sessions.

• We were graced with the presence of Bishops from three neighboring synods. Each spoke for a few minutes with emphasis on relationships, not only in Christ but between synods and with each other. An emphasis was placed upon Luther's explanation of the third article:

I believe that I cannot by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ my Lord or come to Him, but the Holy Spirit has called me by the Gospel, enlightened me with His Gifts and sanctifies me in the one true faith. What a great reminder of our Lutheran doctrine and how we are brought to faith through the power of the Spirit and not by our own doing.

- Five churches with a majority of immigrant membership, and their leaders, were introduced to the Assembly to discuss how they are being affected by some of our current national government's programs.
- Information on both of the synod's properties, Hollis Center and Camp Tomah Shinga, was presented.
- The new president of Bethany College in

Lindsborg was present and spoke to the gathering.

- We were treated to a wonderful meal on Thursday night, lunch on Friday, and a beautiful celebration on Friday night for the Bishop Susan Candea, and the Bishop's Associate Rev. Dave Whetter.
- Pastor Ted Mosher had been asked previous to the convention to provide a video, thanking Rev. Dave Whetter for his years of service to the Central States Synod. This was presented near the end of Saturday's session.
- Saturday's session included a powerful Bible study by Rev. Dave Whetter talking about our baptism and the new command that Jesus gave to love one another. We were given some time to talk around our table and what this new commandment meant to us and finally shared some of our thoughts with the entire assembly. We concluded with an uplifting service filled with prayer, Bible readings, a message and singing.

Thank you for allowing us to serve as your GSLC delegates, alongside Pastor Ted.

## **Seeking Cleaning Volunteers**

As is our practice, when a need arises, we bring it to the attention of the congregation and invite you to respond. We recently wished godspeed to Elena Cressy, Music Minister for Classic Worship. Elena will be pursuing her doctorate at the University of Iowa this fall.



# Hospitality Ministry Team Exploring AED Device and CPR Training for Good Shepherd

The Hospitality Ministry Team is always seeking ways to help Good Shepherd be a safe and welcoming place for everyone. As part of that mission, we are looking into acquiring an **Automated External Defibrillator (AED)** for our church facility, and we'd like to know if there's interest in offering a First Aid/CPR class for our congregation and volunteers.

An AED is a portable device used to treat sudden cardiac arrest—a life-threatening condition that can happen to anyone, anywhere, at any time. The device analyzes the heart's rhythm and, if necessary, delivers an electric shock to help the heart reestablish a normal rhythm. AEDs are designed to be simple to use, even for people without medical training, and can make a critical difference in the minutes before emergency services arrive.

Installing an AED and training members in Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) would help ensure that we're prepared to respond to emergencies with care and confidence. It's just one more way we can look out for one another in love and service.



To move forward, we'd love your input!

- Would you be interested in attending a CPR and AED training class at the church?
- Are you already certified in CPR or have medical training? If so, we'd love to know who in our congregation may already be able to assist in an emergency.

Do you have experience with AEDs or knowledge that might help us as we research and acquire the right equipment?
